Reference Group Executive Summary Spring 2014

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Introduction

The ACHA-National College Health Assessment II (ACHA-NCHA II) is a national research survey organized by the American College Health Association (ACHA) to assist college health service providers, health educators, counselors, and administrators in collecting data about their students' habits, behaviors, and perceptions on the most prevalent health topics.

ACHA initiated the original ACHA-NCHA in 2000 and the instrument was used nation wide through the spring 2008 data collection period. The ACHA-NCHA now provides the largest known comprehensive data set on the health of college students, providing the college health and higher education fields with a vast spectrum of information on student health.

The revised survey, the ACHA-NCHA-II, was developed following a thorough pilot testing process. Although the general categories of information for which data are collected remain the same between the original ACHA-NCHA and this revised survey, a number of questions have been modified, and new questions have been added to monitor a variety of health constructs. Specific revisions include updated lists of illegal drugs, contraceptive methods, and vaccines. New items have been added to capture sleep behaviors, self-injury, the use/abuse of prescription drugs and additional mental health issues.

Please note the ACHA-NCHA II is not appropriate for trend comparison of items from the original ACHA-NCHA survey. A new baseline for ACHA-NCHA II began in the fall of 2008. Directly comparing pre- and post-redesign estimates on similar data points, without taking into account the impact of the survey's redesign, might lead to an erroneous conclusion. Note on use of data:

Missing values have been excluded from analysis. Students responding "not applicable" were excluded from several analyses, which are specifically noted throughout this document. All response categories were included, including "don't know" or "0" unless otherwise noted.

This Executive Summary highlights results of the ACHA-NCHA II Spring 2014 survey for a Graduates Reference Group consisting of 9,570 respondents.

Findings

A. General Health of College Students

- \blacksquare 64.0 % of college students surveyed (65.9 % male and 62.7 % female) described their health as *very good or excellent*.
- ■93.5 % of college students surveyed (93.7 % male and 93.4 % female) described their health as *good*, *very good or excellent*.

B. Disease and Injury Prevention

College students reported receiving the following vaccinations (shots):

- 76.1 % reported receiving vaccination against hepatitis B.
- 34.2 % reported receiving vaccination against Human Papillomavirus/HPV (cervical cancer vaccine).
- 50.2 % reported receiving vaccination against influenza (flu) in the last 12 months (shot or nasal mist).
- 84.3 % reported receiving vaccination against measles, mumps, rubella.
- 62.1 % reported receiving vaccination against meningococcal meningitis.
- 45.5 % reported receiving vaccination against varicella (chicken pox).

Other disease prevention practices reported by college students:

- 66.2 % reported having a dental exam and cleaning in the last 12 months.
- 30.2 % of males reported performing a testicular self exam in the last 30 days.
- 40.9 % of females reported performing a breast self exam in the last 30 days.
- 65.0 % of females reported having a routine gynecological exam in the last 12 months.
- 60.2 % reported using sunscreen regularly with sun exposure.
- 39.1 % reported ever being tested for Human Immunodeficiency Virus (HIV) infection.

Due to the improbability of a student surviving a drinking episode resulting in an extremely high eBAC, all students with an eBAC of 0.50 or higher are also omitted from these eBAC figures. eBAC is an estimated figure based on the reported number of drinks consumed during the last time they "partied" or socialized, their approximate time of consumption, sex, weight, and the average rate of ethanol metabolism.

Demographics of Participating Institutions

One hundred sixty eight postsecondary institutions self-selected to participate in the Spring 2014 ACHA National College Health Assessment and 94,197 surveys were completed by students on these campuses. For the purpose of forming the Reference Group, only institutions located in the United States that surveyed all students or used a random sampling technique are included in the analysis, yielding a final data set consisting of 79,266 students at 140 schools. **This report includes only data from 9,570 GRADUATE/PROFESSIONAL students at 87 schools.** Demographic characteristics of the 87 campuses follow. *Note that schools surveying in the 30 days following their Spring Break are omitted from this report.*
